Munawir explained in Ramayuris that murshid comes from Arabic, meaning "to teach." Meanwhile, Mursyid is similar to the words al-daril and mualim, which means guide, guide, teacher, or teacher. He continuously carries out his duties to help the student achieve his goals and provides guidance whenever and wherever needed. Munawir gives an etymological explanation of muzaki in Ramayuris. It is an Arabic term for ism and refers to sigat al-ism al-fail, or the individual who does. The four letters of al-final make up the word "muzak"; Zakka means "name," and zakka also means "development, growth, growth." Various objects may also symbolize washing, purifying, repairing, and strengthening. In other words, the term Tazakka is also present. It means tashaddaq, namely zakat, almsgiving, and virtue and piety. Al-Zakat means "purity, purity, and sadaqah," just like Al-Taharat and Al-Shadakat.
